Reflection and Prayer for the 7th Sunday after Trinity

This week's Old Testament reading is from the Book of Jeremiah. Of all the Old Testament prophets I think Jeremiah is my favourite. In fact the philosopher and writer Ernest Renan said this about Jeremiah:

Without this extraordinary being, the religious history of humanity would have taken another course, and Christianity would never have happened.

That's a remarkable statement but until I got to know more about Jeremiah I saw him as a bit of a misery – always harping on about how sinful the people were and how they would get their comeuppance. He was constantly bewailing his own lot too and generally didn't seem to have very much joy for life.

The people of Jeremiah's own time certainly thought he was a prophet of doom. They closed their ears to what he had to say, and eventually even banished him from Jerusalem. They just couldn't see what his problem was.

But when you look carefully at the writings of Jeremiah you will see a man who had a genuine concern for the people of God. He was like a parent who wants what is best for their child, but like a bunch of recalcitrant teenagers the people refuse to listen and when the inevitable happens wish they had.

Things are not so different today. People who speak up, who speak the truth, are often treated like Jeremiah was treated. If the message is hard to hear they are simply not believed. As Christians we are called both to heed the voice of the prophets and to be like them – speaking out for God. You may be thinking that you couldn't possibly be a prophet, standing up and speaking out; or the kind of travelling preachers or healers that the apostles were - a Paul or even a Jeremiah - but you can. For there are two fundamental elements which are essential to Christian discipleship: how you pray and how you live.
